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HEADMASTER'S MESSAGE

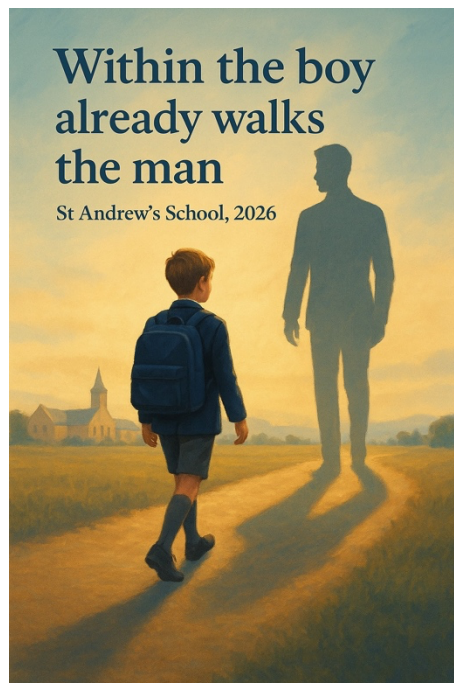

HISTORY OF THE SCHOOL IN BRIEF

St Andrew's came into being on 16 November 1863 as the Diocesan Grammar School. It was founded by Bishop Edward Twells in response to the need for organised schooling for the boys of Bloemfontein. Mr George Clegg was the school's first Headmaster.

The original school room still stands in St George's Street and is known as the Old Raadsaal, a national monument. Shortly before the outbreak of the Anglo-Boer war, the school was due to move to a building on the site of the current Oranje Meisieskool. The move, though, never took place as the school was closed when the war broke out and the building was requisitioned as a military hospital.

St Andrew's re-opened in 1916 and moved to its current site in Westdene in 1917, which was then on the edge of the city. The oldest building still in use on the campus appears to be the lower storey of the senior school (Ferrandi) block which was in use in 1919.

During its early years, the school made use of buildings in the town, on the current site and on the Tempe military base. As funds became available, more and more buildings were erected on the current site and eventually all the boys and classes were moved there.

The history of the school's close ties with the Anglican Church began with the school's founding in 1863. In those days the boys sang in the cathedral choir and assisted in the services. The first chairman of the school committee (now known as the Board of Governors) was the priest in charge of the cathedral and for years the Church was responsible for the financial management of the school. The Church and a number of bishops also assisted by raising funds for capital developments at the school.

In the 19th century most of the headmasters were priests who led the school for short periods of time. Since the 20th century none of the headmasters have been priests, but the school has nevertheless maintained a very close link with the church.

From the early days, religious instruction made up a prominent part of the school curriculum and that continues to this day, with each day beginning with a short service in the school chapel.

The school's first chapel was built in 1881 and over the years a number of different buildings served in that capacity. The current chapel was consecrated in 1956. Its position near to the entrance of the school and the importance placed upon chapel services emphasise the prominence given to Christian teaching at the school. Until January 1976 St Andrew's was a diocesan school operating under the control of a Board of Governors, with the Bishop of Bloemfontein as its Chairman.

In 1975, it was sold to the Provincial Administration of the Orange Free State. The agreement with the Province protects the right of the school to retain its ethos and to continue as an Anglican Church school with the Bishop of Bloemfontein as the Visitor. Over the years the school has striven to maintain its link with the Church and to inculcate good values in its boys.

St Andrew's School has been providing educational opportunities for boys from different faiths and cultural traditions who reside in Bloemfontein, the Free State, the other provinces of South Africa and beyond the borders of the country for well over a century-and-a-half. It caters for boys from the age of three (enrolled in the Little Saints pre-primary school) to the age of 18 years.

CHAPEL

Our “little” Chapel lies at the heart of the School. It beats to affirm our ethos. It pulses in rhythm with the aims and goals of a nurturing community. Here education has a spiritual value as well as an academic, sporting and cultural one. Consecrated in 1956, the St Andrew’s Chapel has stood as a witness to our School’s faith. It is an Anglican Chapel that tells a story in flags. These House Flags adorn the walls with a unique history reaching back into our School’s humble beginnings, more than 150-years ago.

The kneelers speak of the labour of love in the embroidery of the Ladies Association and moms. A hue of dignity pervades. Archbishop Dr Clayton said of our Chapel, “The Anglican Church does not claim to be the whole Church, but she does claim to teach the whole Faith, She accepts the Creed and the Scriptures. There is nothing else to which she commits her members”. The very existence of the Chapel among the buildings of a school is a witness which is not without its effect. Few, if any, boys go through their school life without passing through periods of stress and strain. In such periods it is in the Chapel and its services, and in the teaching given there, that they find strength and comfort and hope. And lastly, the Chapel gives an opportunity for school worship. “My duty towards God is to worship Him. This Chapel will not let you forget the Majesty of God, the best building, you can provide; the best music you can give: craftsman’s art and music’s measure: such splendour of ceremonial – all this impresses on your mind the Majesty and the Holiness of God. The hearts of Children hold what worlds cannot.”

Regular Sunday services, special services (e.g. Old Boys Reunion, Carols and Ash Wednesday), confirmation, choral and daily services take place in an atmosphere of reverence, humility and greatness of spirit.

The School community comes together at 09:00 each Sunday. Many members of the broader Bloemfontein community, parents and visitors join us on these occasions. The altar is festooned with the colour of the Season, the sacristans participate in the act of worship, the Matrics read the lessons and the choir raises the roof. We also invite other schools in town to join us for combined services, once per term. School life is intertwined with the Church Year as the story continues. Perhaps the School Prayer speaks best of our enduring witness to the glory of God; that God’s light may radiate through our worship and into every classroom, and from every classroom into every heart; and from every heart, into our world beyond.

The Chapel is the heart of the School and the role of the Chaplain is a key function in the life of our community. The Chaplain works across the Combined School (Pre-Primary, Junior and Senior), doing daily Chapel, addresses and devotions. Sunday evening services are held each week of Term, mainly for the Boarders and associated community, but are open to all.

WHAT DOES A CHAPLAIN DO?

When people hear the word chaplain, they might imagine someone who simply says prayers at assemblies. In reality, the chaplain’s role is much broader, deeper, and woven into every part of school life. At St Andrew’s — from Little Saints to the Senior School — the chaplain is more than just a spiritual leader; they are a companion, guide, and support for learners, staff, and families.

Here’s a glimpse of what the chaplain does every week:

1. **Chapel Assemblies** – Leading worship and reflection: five times a week for the senior school, three times a week for the junior school, and once a week for Little Saints.
2. **Counselling** – Offering a listening ear for learners as they face challenges, from everyday struggles to deeper heartaches.
3. **Prayer and Support** – Praying with and for learners, staff, and parents, offering encouragement in times of need.
4. **Hospital Visits** – Visiting learners, parents, and grandparents in hospital, bringing comfort and pastoral care.
5. **Chapel Life** – Caring for the chapel, working alongside the choirmaster to guide the choir, and mentoring the sacristans who assist with daily duties.
6. **Life’s Sacred Moments** – Leading baptisms, memorial services, funerals, and blessing marriages.
7. **School Functions** – Opening gatherings and events with prayer and a message from God.
8. **Confirmation Classes** – Preparing learners for the journey of confirmation.
9. **Spiritual Leadership** – Providing direction for the whole school community, keeping us rooted in faith and values.
10. **A Chaplain’s Dream** – That every learner and staff member will understand how deeply God loves them, and that together we will always cling to Him.

LITTLE SAINTS, ST ANDREW'S PRE-PRIMARY

Go beyond the entry gates and you are transported into a very special pre-school for grades 000, 00 and R.

Wonderfully-equipped, Little Saints is home to a stimulating, happy environment, where a tightly-knit group of very dedicated teachers provides young boys with a superb foundation for their future school lives.

A warm energy fills the school and smiles are plentiful. It truly is a home from home for each child entrusted to the care of the teachers.

The boys' days are meticulously planned out, so that they are subjected to a rich diversity of experiences, which encompass learning and playing. A wide variety of special activities are also organised each year to add spice to the children's experiences.

The school's motto captures its ethos: "Let your inner light shine!"

Daily activities

07:00	Gates open- Early arrivals assemble in one class under that group teacher's supervision

07:30 – 07h55	All group teachers open classes – Greet children and get ready for the day's activities
08:00 – 08:10	Prayer, register, weather, news, song, rhymes etc.
08:10 – 08:40	LTA (Learn Through Activity) school readiness activities- teacher guided – maths, language, life skills – CAPS
08:40 – 08:50	Tidy up inside – move outside for concentration break – free play in enriched garden
08:50 – 09:40	Creative Play inside (paint, cutting, collage, dough, drawing, block play, construction toys, fantasy play, book corner) – free choice
09:40 – 10:00	Tidy up inside – move outside for concentration break – free play in enriched garden
10:00 – 10:30	Ring Time – music ring, movement ring, Bible ring, language ring, maths ring and whole school ring
10:30 – 10:40	Toilet routine
10:40 – 11:10	Refreshments – snack time with placemats, plates and flowers set out on tables
11:10 – 11:55	Free Play Outside – all teachers outside to guide free play in enriched garden
11:55 – 12:10	Tidy up outside play area – all children help to tidy up with teachers
12:10 – 12:30	LTA – language reinforcement of vocabulary, maths exercise or movement and balance development.
12:30 – 12:45	Storytime
12:45 – 13:15	Rest/music listening – Parents collect their children. Play quietly at tables etc.
13:15	All children must have been collected by parents

* We use the Department of Education CAPS programme and NELDS document outcomes as our reference for assessments.

* The outcomes will be repeated a few times before assessment is done and assessment is informal.

* Outcomes are incorporated in different games and active participation by the learners is ESSENTIAL.

* Sensory activities are VITAL as well as daily MOVEMENT activities.

* Repetition of activities ensures that children get the chance to be successful!

* 1st term report to parents – parent/teacher interview and discussion (Building a better parent/teacher relationship because although the education of the young child is primarily the parent's job, we as teachers have an important role to play.) This is repeated in Term 3.

* 2nd and 4th term reports – written reports to parents.

* Teachers will not hesitate to ask for a meeting to discuss with parents anything they deem necessary.

Special Activities/Outings

Special activities will be organised during the year. These will vary to keep it interesting.
Grandparent's day, Ladies tea, fun sports day, book education /story week.

Outings are organised to different locations according to different themes: eg. Musicon, museum, fire station, army, Airforce, shop (Fruit & Veg City), garden centre etc.

Fun days at school eg. Braai day, watermelon day, fantasy day, building-my-house-day, pet day, reptile day and many more.....

Tuck Shop will be held at least once a term and we have an end of year concert and graduation ceremony

A blended, child-centered learning approach will allow every learner to be creative, to solve problems, to think critically and to communicate effectively.

At our school, education is the driver and technology the accelerator. Using a wide range of resources, teachers make learning in every subject relevant, meaningful, and enjoyable. A dynamic school management team, administrative team and an extremely competent school governing body achieve high-quality teaching and learning within an ever-changing teaching environment in the world.

Foundation Phase (Grade 1- 3)

The Foundation Phase follows the CAPS-curriculum as a guideline to our Saints curriculum. Our educators make use of various educational strategies and resources to enhance the delivery of knowledge, skills, and values.

English (HL), Afrikaans (FAL) and Sesotho (SAL) are offered as languages with Mathematics and Life Skills. A well-structured Physical Development Programme, that is unique to Saints, is incorporated in our school day.

Using CAPS as our foundation, we add body to our curriculum with programmes such as: Phonics International, The Oxford Reading Tree and a variety of Mathematical programmes. Life Skill themes are integrated into our curriculum. Learners start with Robotics in Grade 1 in our dedicated Robotics lab.

Music lessons are offered to individuals, starting with the recorder. The boys participate in various Eisteddfods and art festivals. Learner support is offered through remedial and intervention classes, where the need of each individual is addressed. Chapel forms part of our daily routine and adds to the values of our school.

We strive to develop the whole child and keep in touch with the latest educational developments.

Intermediate Phase (Grade 4 – 6)

At Saints it is our vision to provide a stimulating, inclusive learning environment where all boys are lead in the development of their intellectual and physical potential within our sound value system.

In the intermediate phase we put a big focus on the basic foundations of learning. We follow the CAPS curriculum. We have a clear whole school development plan for English and Mathematics to prepare our boys for high school. We encourage and value reading to enhance a better understanding of our world and others. We offer Intervention in various subjects to help learners who struggle with concepts in these learning areas.

Our syllabus consists of:

- English Home Language
- Afrikaans First Additional Language/ Sesotho First Additional Language
- Mathematics
- Natural Science and Technology
- Social Sciences
- Life Skills
- In the Junior School additional subjects include Art, Music, Robotics, Sports Development and Conversational Sesotho, after which it becomes a choice of second language with Afrikaans.

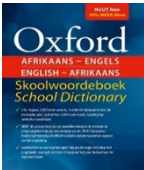

Academic and Subjects

Stationery

Stationery is to be provided by parents at the beginning of each term and kept neat and tidy and replaced when needed. All boys are issued with a school diary that is used daily for homework, signing out and general information.

Book Room

At the beginning of each year, textbooks and workbooks are issued to learners. Workbooks for high school learners are issued from the book storeroom in the Ferrandi Block. Textbooks are collected at a separate venue, as announced by the teachers in charge each year. Textbooks are allocated to a specific learner who then signs for them. Textbooks are to be covered in plastic according to the teachers' instructions.

Lost and damaged books are to be paid for at the end of the year. No books are issued at the beginning of a year to learners who have outstanding books or payments for lost or damaged books.

Sport Awards

Decisions are made by the Colours Committee following detailed representation by the coach of the activity. The recommendations include length of service, all-round contribution to the team, statistics, averages, records, leadership qualities, provincial and national representation.

Only senior boys (i.e., those competing in the open age groups) can qualify for colours.

Colours awards are only made for sports in which a team or individual has represented the school in competition. The award of colours for individual sports is based primarily on the attainment of colours, times, or an outstanding contribution to the team. Free State representation is taken as a guideline. However, the award of Provincial Colours does not automatically qualify a boy for School Colours.

No pupil at St Andrew's School will qualify for an award at any level unless his sportsmanship, manners and general deportment comply with the required standards of the school (i.e., his deportment both on and off the field should meet acceptable standards).

SCHOOL HOUSES

Every boy at St Andrew's is allocated to one of our houses – Champion, Clegg and Mackenzie – being the day boy houses. The boarders are allocated to the boarding house consisting of Storey, Twells, Chandler and Dunn House. The purpose of allocating boys to a house is to create a sense of identity and belonging. Each of the houses are headed up by a House Head at the school along with a support team of teachers. The boys part in an inter-house competition that includes academics, sport, culture and service.

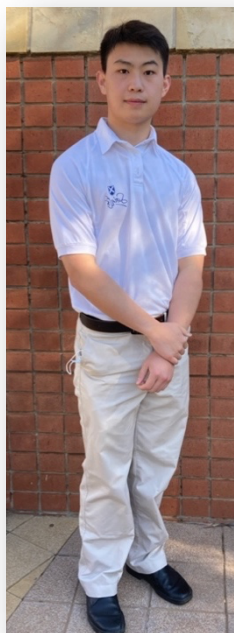

There can be few, if any, better ways of measuring the tone, the soul, character and values of a school than appraising its former pupils and their interest in the school. There is little doubt, then, that Saint Andrew's is among the best supported schools in South Africa by its Old Boys.

They are scattered throughout South Africa, Africa, Great Britain, North America, South America, Europe, the Middle East, Far East and Australasia. The South African diaspora of the late 20th century has seen the movement of many Old Andreans to other parts of the world. Their influence has been felt in countless aspects of South African and overseas life, from the church to professionals, mining, farming and the armed services. These Old Andreans, by and large, are indeed proud of the fact that they were privileged to receive their education at St Andrew's and have formed their own branches in various parts of the world.

The Old Boys' Association (OBA) was formally established in July 1922 when a small group of Old Andreans in Bloemfontein, fired by the enthusiasm of Mr S M Sweet, organised the OBA on a firm basis with a well thought out constitution and committed leadership. The Association has since grown steadily, with branches in Bloemfontein, Mpumalanga, Kimberley, Maseru, East London, Port Elizabeth, Port Alfred, Knysna, Durban, Johannesburg, Cape Town, London, Dubai and Hong Kong. More informal reunions have also been held in cities such as Brisbane, Sydney, Auckland, Vancouver and Toronto.

Regular social gatherings are held in these branches and, from time to time, particularly when their own class reunions take place, Old Boys attend the main Bloemfontein reunion, which is held in September. These Old Andreans travel from far and wide, to Bloemfontein, to visit their old school and catch up with old pals and classmates.

The Old Boys' Association is governed and controlled by a central committee in Bloemfontein, although branches tend to be autonomous.

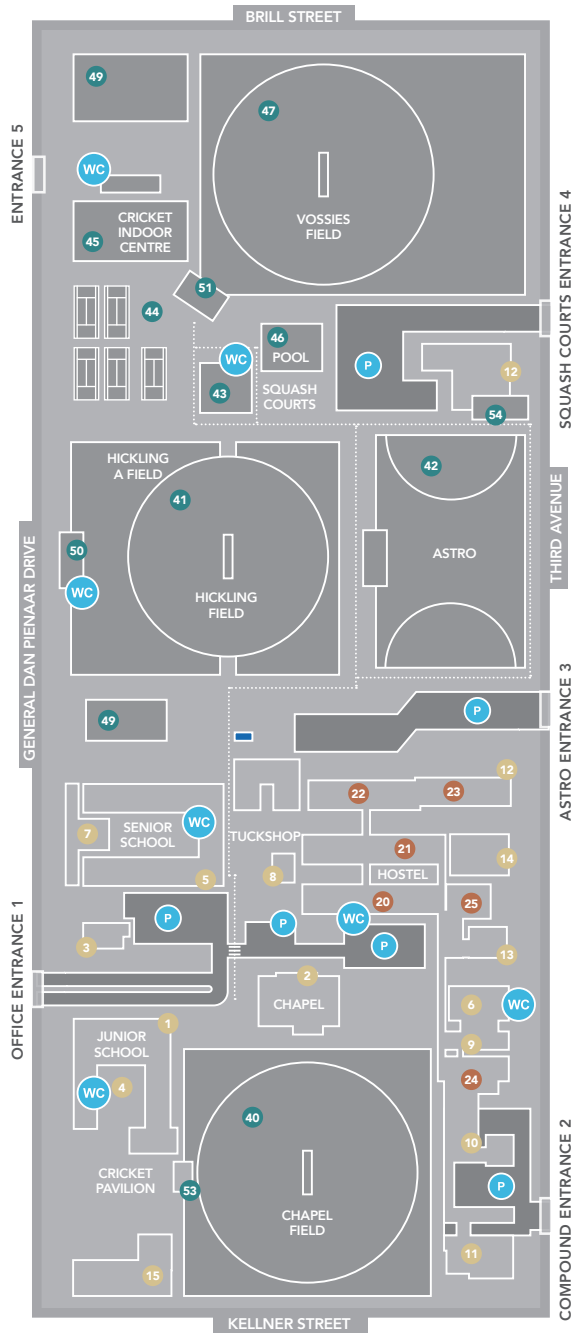

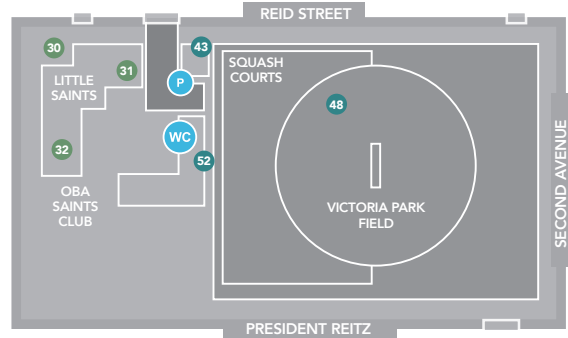

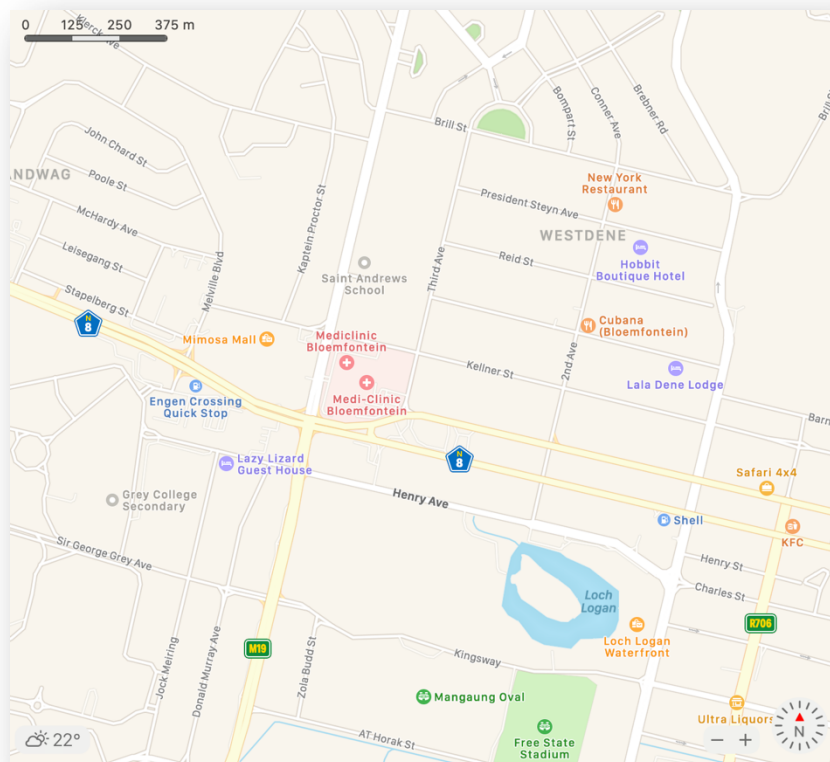
